





Gaining Ground by Forrest Pritchard

Forrest Pritchard is a seventh generation farmer and New York Times bestselling author. Upon returning from college, he took over his grandparents' farm—primarily growing GMO corn and soybeans—hoping to make the land profitable for the first time in decades. When five tractor-trailer loads of grain reaped a meager paycheck of \$18.16, he realized his family's farm must radically change. The following season, he devoted himself to farming organically and sustainably, raising free-range cattle, pigs, sheep, goats and chickens.

Twenty years later, his farm is one of the oldest "grass finished" farms in the country, and sells at leading farmers' markets. Forrest's book Gaining Ground, A Story of Farmers' Markets, Local Food and Saving the Family Farm was named a top read by Publishers Weekly, The Washington Post and NPR's The Splendid Table, and is a New York Times Bestseller.

The library's art classes, organized through the Little Art Gallery, are designed to meet the needs and abilities of each student as well as foster creativity, social skills and individual growth.

Mixed Media classes provide experience working with a variety of materials and processes including painting, drawing, collage and 3-D materials.

Children's classes are held one day each week for four weeks. The fee is \$18.

Adult classes are held one day each week for four weeks at \$22 or eight weeks at \$45.
