Whether your elementary school student is stumped by math, struggling with reading or simply needs someone new to help them with their spelling words, the library can help! With funding provided by the North Canton Rotary Club and The Rotary Foundation, as well as the help of several partner organizations and community volunteers, the North Canton Public Library will continue its Homework Help program in February and March.

What it IS:

- Help with school assignments related to spelling, reading and math for children in grades K-5
- An extra set of ears to listen to a child practice reading
- Someone new to help a child study their spelling words
- Guided educational fun using technology (iPads and other tablets) to practice basic concepts
- Enthusiastic volunteers, ages 13 and older, who are generously giving their time to offer this community service
