#LIBRARYMADNESS

This past March, we asked the question book lovers love to answer—what's your favorite book? Not only did we ask, we decided to make an entire month-long tournament out of it, and #LibraryMadness was born.

It actually all began when I pitched the idea of #LibraryMadness to some of my coworkers, who then were crazy enough to say, "Sounds great! How can I help?" Through December and January, we worked on the details, from selecting the name #LibraryMadness to how we would select the books to put in the tournament to coming up with the perfect logo.

We finally decided to let all of you pick the books for the tournament, and we spent February soliciting nominations, with what in hindsight are some interesting results. For instance, if we had stopped at the nomination phase, *The Great Gatsby* would have won. But while Fitzgerald's classic received the most nominations, it was defeated by *To Kill a Mockingbird*, not even making the finals. Results like this are why we actually vote!


The tournament also led to some amazing conversations about books. People stopped in to pick up the original bracket to use as a reading list, and some even took extras to show friends. And boy, were people free with their opinions! Favorite books spark deep passions, and I witnessed (and maybe even participated in) a few vehement discussions of why one book should beat another. It was really a month marked by invigorating conversations about literature, and there are few things that make me as excited to come to work.

At the end of the day, the winner was the exceptionally worthy *Night*, a painful and brilliantly written Holocaust memoir by Elie Wiesel. As soon as I finished counting the votes, I was entirely pleased with the outcome (as much as I do enjoy Harry Potter, the runner-up), and I realized how much this book deserves to be read and discussed.

That's why I've scheduled the first ever #LibraryMadness book discussion. On Wednesday, June 26 at 6:30 p.m. we will meet to talk about *Night*, as well as the #LibraryMadness experience and why we love the books we do. Beginning June 1 copies of *Night* will be available at the checkout desk if you would like to read this magnificent book before the discussion. I, for one, am endlessly fascinated by what makes books connect with readers and why we love what we do, and I'm looking forward to discussing books in general and *Night* specifically with all of you, whether or not you participated in what I suspect will be the first of many #LibraryMadness events.





YOUR LIBRARY CARD

a passport to explore the world



Your library card gives you access to a world of information at NCPL. Use it at the library during open hours. Use it on our website after hours. Our world is always available in one form or another.

GET A CARD

1. Complete our brief application online.
2. Bring a Driver's License or State I.D. with your current address. If you don't have your current address on your I.D., you will need to bring a form with your name and new address on it, such as a utility bill, insurance notification or lease agreement.
3. Your card will be ready in minutes and you may check items out the same day.

Teachers

Teacher library cards allow up to 100 children's books to be checked out at any time for six weeks with one two-week renewal available. Teacher privileges apply only to children's books for classroom use. Other library materials including talking books, music CDs, kits, electronic devices and DVDs must be checked out using a general patron library card. As with all library cards, overdue items will be charged a late fee and full price will be charged for lost or damaged items. We strive to assist North Canton Public Schools educators and homeschoolers. Visit the children's department for information on the many special services we offer.

Golden Buckeye Card Holders

Patrons of any age who have a Golden Buckeye Card qualify for fine free status. Simply show us your card one time, and we will change the status of your account to be fine free. Golden Buckeye Card holders continue to receive notices about late items and will still be charged replacement costs if materials are lost.

Children 17 and Under

Children are eligible for their own library cards. Parents must agree to comply with library rules and regulations, pay all fines and fees, and make good any loss or damage incurred to materials borrowed on their child's card.

RENEWALS

Any library item checked out from the North Canton Public Library will be automatically renewed unless one of the following circumstances prevents renewal.

Items will not be renewed if:

- Another customer places a request on that item.
- The item has reached its maximum number of renewals.
- Fines on the account have reached \$10.
- Your account activity has been blocked.
- The item is a digital eMaterial.
- The item is from another library.

RETURNING ITEMS

Library items may be returned in the outdoor book drops (unless otherwise marked) or inside the library during regular hours. If you are concerned about an item being checked in the day it is due, please walk it inside to return it. Dropping items in the drop box outside does not ensure they will be checked in the same day, depending on scheduled times for emptying the bins.


