ELIGIBILITY

The call for entries is open to any artist 16 years of age or older living or working in Stark County. All works submitted must be original, recent and not previously exhibited in a Little Art Gallery show. All media will be accepted.

THE ELLA M. LAZICH TRUST

Ella (Drazich) Lazich was born in Steubenville, Ohio in 1929. It was from there she began her love and affection for books. Her home was two blocks from the Carnegie Library where she was a frequent visitor. She often said that the library opened the world to her and opened her mind to the possibilities for her. She attended Steubenville High School; then, in her junior year, her family moved to a close suburb, Wintersville, where Ella was valedictorian of her graduating class.

She worked in retail clothing stores throughout high school to earn money to further her education. Upon graduation from Century College in Chicago, she was employed by the Ohio Valley Hospital as a laboratory technician. Ella continued in this work when she married Perry Lazich in 1952. Both worked at the 6th Army Hospital, Camp Cook With little money to do much, Ella and Perry were weekly patrons at the Santa Maria Library.

They settled in Barberton, Ohio where Perry was employed in the rubber tire industry, and Ella, was a lab tech at Akron City Hospital. With little to do in a two-bedroom home, without children yet and Perry continuing his education at night, Ella joined a discussion group based on the Great Books Foundation. A sample of the 27 volumes studied and discussed included classics such as Aristotle, Plato, Shakespeare, and Adam Smith. The subject matter included philosophy, spiritual and economic thought.

The couple moved to the Canton area, settling in North Canton where their three children graduated from North Canton Hoover High School. Only five minutes from the North Canton Public Library, the whole family used the many resources.

In 1986, with children grown, Ella decided to enroll as a full-time student at Kent State University, majoring in English. She graduated cum laude in 1990 and was the first student trustee of Kent State University.

In 1999, Ella believed it was time to pay back to the North Canton Public Library and to the city. A charitable remainder trust was established to benefit the Library. Both Perry and Ella were trustees of the fund but recently, the fund was restructured as the Ella M. Lazich Trust, for the benefit of the North Canton Public Library.

To establish the trust for the Library's benefit, a new document was drawn giving the Commercial and Savings Bank's Trust Department full administrative responsibility on behalf of the Library. The income from the trust is to fund programs to the community sponsored by the Library for children and adults, including speaking fees and other program related expenses. Income from the fund may also be used to purchase books or other library collection needs.

The Lazich family encourages patrons of the Library and citizens of North Canton to contact Commercial & Savings Bank to make tax deductible contributions to the trust in hopes that the fund will grow and add resources to the Library and its patrons.

The North Canton Public Library is tremendously grateful for this gesture of generosity from the Lazich family. Ella's three children and husband made their final contribution to the Library Fund to commemorate Ella's 92nd birthday on March 17, 2021.








