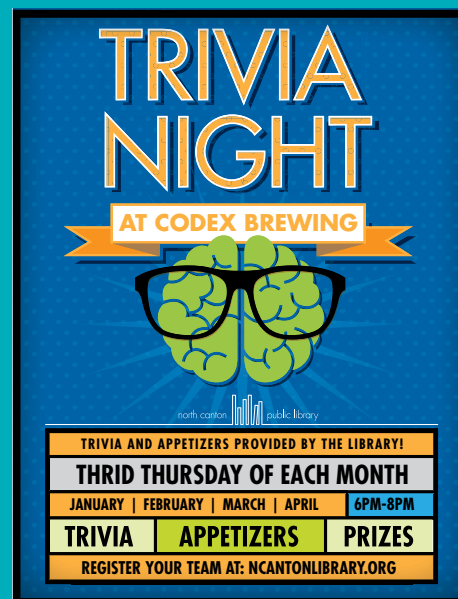

ARTIST: ERIN T. MULLIGAN TITLE: "CONNECTIONS"

Erin T. Mulligan is a professional fine oil painter and instructor living and working in Canton, Ohio. She has always loved drawing, and receiving guidance from her mother, local artist Michelle Mulligan, and grand-mother, Ardy Mulligan from a very young age, she grew up in an environment full of encouragement. In 2003-2004 Erin studied the glazing methods of the old Dutch masters with Frank Dale. To summarize the technique, it is a complete drawing with multiple layers of transparent oil colors. This is the style of painting Erin still uses today, always pushing for more detail, and more dynamic finished works. Inspired by the natural world and the complexities of humanity, Erin's meticulously detailed paintings are at once whimsical, metaphoric, and sometimes a little creepy.

Back in 1926, when the North Canton Library Association was established with a purpose of maintaining a free library for the residents of North Canton, public libraries operated a bit differently than they do now.

Fast forward one hundred years, and I think it's safe to say we've changed a little, but the important parts have remained the same. We still have an incredible collection of books... as well as collections of tools, technology, games, and multimedia. We still have quiet areas for study within our building... but we also encourage kids to dance and sing and play in story time programs. And while our beautiful building has and always will be a North Canton mainstay... we also realize that we can't expect our community to come to us and use us in the same way they did 100 years ago. Like so many other businesses and organizations, we've had to recalibrate a little bit and figure out how to better serve our patrons.

That's where our outreach van came into play. For the last few years, we've been slowly growing our presence beyond the walls of our library building. What started as deliveries to nursing homes and home bound residents grew to a vibrant presence at local festivals, community events, schools, farmer's markets, and more. And not to disparage our staff members' Subarus and SUVs, but it's really, really difficult to do all of that without a dedicated vehicle big enough to haul equipment back and forth – not to mention it's not very safe for our staff to be lugging tables and chairs and canopies all over the community.

So when the opportunity to apply for a federal American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) grant that would almost fully fund a custom-made outreach vehicle presented itself last year, I jumped on it – and then quickly assigned the writing of it to our fabulous Community Relations Manager, Christina Weyrick, and our wonderful Community Engagement Librarian, Elizabeth Pucci. We asked for the full amount: \$100,000. We submitted it. And then we waited. We knew we were asking for a lot of money. And we knew the competition was fierce. But in September of last year, we received the news that we were one of 45 institutions in the state who were granted their requested funds. It wasn't long after that announcement that we began the process of ordering and custom-building the vehicle that you are now seeing in our community. It's truly a "dream come true" type of accomplishment for all of us.

I want to recognize and express thanks to some important groups and people who helped us in this journey:

- To the State Library of Ohio for giving our library this tremendous opportunity by offering such a generous grant award;
- To our Library's Board of Trustees for their support and enthusiasm for this and so many other projects;
- To the City of North Canton for giving us the chance and the space to expand our programming at the North Canton Civic Center;
- To Farber Specialty Vehicles out of Columbus for their unending patience as we emailed back and forth and back and forth and back again to get the little details just right;
- To Joe Rozsa for the beautiful wrap design;
- To our North Canton community for sticking with us through a pandemic and cheering us on each step of the way – this is, truly, all for you;
- To our fabulous library staff, for making sure that as we pursued this dream, all other pieces and parts of the organization were working as they should;
- And to the incredible library staff who made the magic happen: Kelly Boggs, our fiscal officer, for adding yet another folder of grant reports to her already-full plate; Sam Kuikahi, our outreach associate who is responsible for all of the amazing outreach programs happening at the North Canton Civic Center; Elizabeth Pucci, our community engagement librarian who helped to write the grant and has been instrumental in getting it on the road – literally; and Christina Weyrick, our community relations manager who worked so hard to bring this idea to life and who is always there to say "yes, I love it, let's do it" whenever I approach her with an idea, no matter how far-fetched.

We cannot wait to see you on the road!

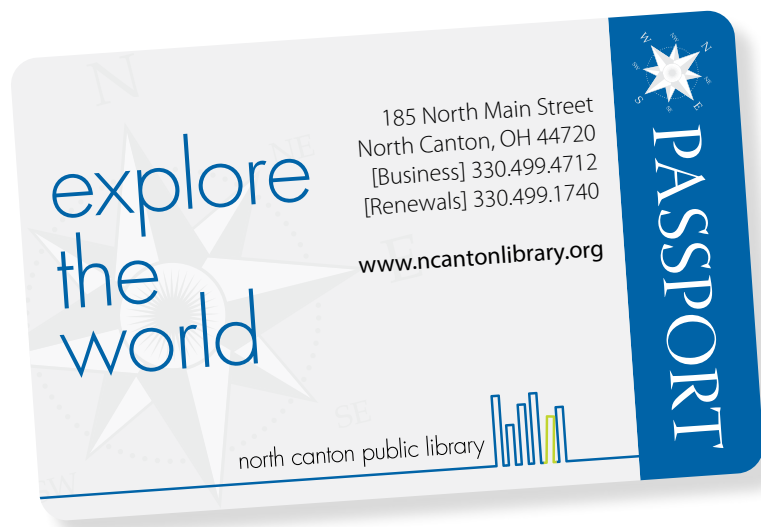

YOUR LIBRARY CARD

a passport to explore the world



Your library card gives you access to a world of information at NCPL. Use it at the library during open hours. Use it on our website or app after hours. Our world is always available in one form or another.

GET A CARD

1. Complete our brief application online.
2. Bring a Driver's License or State I.D. with your current address to the Patron Services Desk at the library. If you don't have your current address on your I.D., you will need to bring a form with your name and new address on it, such as a utility bill, insurance notification or lease agreement.
3. Your card will be ready in minutes and you may check items out the same day.

Teachers

Teacher library cards allow up to 100 children's books to be checked out at any time for six weeks with one two-week renewal available. Teacher privileges apply only to children's books for classroom use. Other library materials including audiobooks, music CDs, kits, electronic devices, and DVDs must be checked out using a general patron library card. As with all library cards, overdue items will be charged a late fee and full price will be charged for lost or damaged items. We strive to assist North Canton Public Schools' educators and homeschoolers. Visit the Children's Department for information on the many special services we offer.

Golden Buckeye Card Holders

Patrons of any age who have a Golden Buckeye Card qualify for fine free status. Simply show us your card one time, and we will change the status of your account to be fine free. Golden Buckeye Card holders continue to receive notices about late items and will still be charged replacement costs if materials are lost or damaged.

Children 17 and Under

Children are eligible for their own library cards. Parents must be present with children visiting the Library and must agree to comply with library rules and regulations, pay all fines and fees, and make good any loss or damage incurred to materials borrowed on their child's card.

CURBSIDE HOLD PICK UP

1. Place a hold online or by calling 330.499.4712.
2. Wait for communication from the Library confirming your item is ready for pickup.
3. Come to the Library to pick up your item. You may come inside and retrieve your item from the hold shelves or you may park in one of the Library to Go Curbside parking spaces in our main lot and text us (using the number on the sign) to take advantage of the curbside service.
