Entries will be accepted February 1 through March 31, 2024.

March 31 the gallery will be closed. March 31 is for sending digital images or Email entries only.

ELIGIBILITY

The call for entries is open to any artist 16 years of age or older living or working in Stark County. Each artist may submit up to four pieces of art. All works submitted must be original, recent (within the past three years) and not previously exhibited in a Little Art Gallery May Show. All media will be accepted.

INSTRUCTIONS

Please note, entries will not be considered fully submitted until the gallery has received all three entry components: Entry Fee, Entry Form, and Entry Image.

Entry Fee: The 2024 entry fee will be accepted in two forms only, cash or check made out to **FLAG** (Friends of the Little Art Gallery). A non-refundable fee of \$15 must be submitted for each piece of art. Entry fees may be delivered to the North Canton Public Library circulation desk or mailed to: The Little Art Gallery c/o the North Canton Public Library, 185 North Main Street, North Canton, OH 44720. Please place your submission fee in an envelope when dropping off and include artist name and title of work with the fee.

Entry Forms: Entry forms can be hand delivered, mailed or emailed to galleries@northcantonlibrary.org.

Entry Images: Images may be emailed to galleries@northcantonlibrary.org, delivered via digital storage device to the North Canton Public Library circulation desk or mailed to The Little Art Gallery c/o the North Canton Public Library, 185 North Main Street, North Canton, OH 44720. Please label digital files with artist's first and last name followed by the title. Please deliver your storage device in an envelope and include artist name and title of work. **Images** of art must be submitted by digital photography in jpeg format for the jurying process. Up to four photographs of each work will be allowed. All components of the art must be visible in the photograph.

NEED ASSISTANCE ?

SUBMISSION REQUIREMENTS

Work must be completely ready to hang or display. Frames must sturdy and in good condition. All art must be clean free of debris, hair, dirt or other foreign objects. Hanging work must have D-rings secured to the back with wire attached. Eyehooks and saw tooth hangers will not be accepted. Art must be properly labeled with completed identification cards attached to the back. Three-dimensional works may have the identification card securely tied to them. The gallery reserves the right to disqualify any work that does not meet these requirements.

NOTIFICATION

Artists will receive an email notification about **accepted works only** on April 14, 2024.

Artists without access to email will receive phone notification by 4 p.m. on April 14, 2024.

JURORS

Two independent jurors will select the works to be exhibited in the 81st Annual May Show. All decisions of the jurors are final. Juror biographies will be printed in the exhibit catalogue.

Best in Show \$500, Second Place \$400, Third Place \$300, People's Choice \$100

DELIVERY

Artists are responsible for delivery of accepted art. An artist representative may deliver art if the artist is unavailable. Late work will be disqualified from the exhibit and will be excluded regardless of circumstances. Please use the Library’s main entrance and proceed to gallery office inside the gallery. The gallery will receive art April 15 between 11 a.m. and 1 p.m. and April 16 between 5 and 7 p.m.

PICK-UP

Art must be picked up following the exhibit. An artist representative may pick-up art if the artist is unavailable. Please use the Library main entrance and proceed to gallery office inside the gallery. The gallery will be open for pick-up July 1 between 11 a.m. and 1 p.m. and July 2 between 5 and 7 p.m.
